Country Summary



Fiji, located South of the Pacific region, with these characteristics:

- small island developing state comprised of 330 islands.
- relatively young population
- two main ethnic groups (i-Taukei, or indigenous Fijian, and Indo-Fijian)
- Net enrolment of 98.7 with equal enrolment rate among boys and girls.
- 96% of primary and secondary schools are community-owned.
- Schools are subsidized through education grant scheme based on enrolment rate.

WASH Programmes

UNICEF Fiji WinS programme is adapted to incorporate disaster risk reduction and emergencies given the vulnerability of Fiji to regular cyclones, floods and rain. How is it implemented? Advocacy, infrastructure, policy, school based management, gender based research, WASH safety planning such as drinking water safety and security

Advocacy

 Demonstration of WASH contribution to health, nutrition, environmental security and other oucomes like gender and disability as well as demonstration of affordability of WinS.

Partnerships

 Leveraging partnerships across sector. UNICEF bridges local and international partners, donors and research and academic institutes closer to Ministry of Education, Heritage and Arts (MoEHA) and Ministry of Health and Medical Services (MoHMS).

Capacity Building

 Training to increase knowledge and capacity to promote behavior change.

Monitoring

Sustainability

- Mainstreaming emergencies in WinS programming (WinSIE).
- Working with and supporting relevant government ministries to strengthen policies and accountability, regulation and monitoring mechanisms.
- Working with services providers like Water Authority of Fiji and community based structures.

Institutionalization of WASH within the education sector

- Ministry of Education, Heritage and Arts leads the implementation of WinS. The WASH in Schools Policy is developed by the Ministry and the Ministry chairs the Technical Working Group on WASH and Education.
- Ministry of Health and Medical Services is engaged primarily with Curriculum Development Unit in ensuring alignment with health messaging in the curriculum and through hygiene promotion activities.
